Sunday, April 1, 2012, 11:00 A.M. Looking Back: What has been Won; What Remains to be Done David McReynolds

A famous veteran radical activist reflects on his life and times. He's seen the end of segregation, the women's liberation movement, the gay liberation movement, and the shift from a bipolar US/Soviet Cold War to a multipolar world, with the US no longer the sole dominant power. He asks what it means for a nation to find its middle class gone, wealth concentrated in the hands of a few, and the "Occupy Movement" springing up.

David worked for Liberation Magazine, at the War Resisters League for four decades, was a member of War Resisters International Council, and served a term as Chair of the WRI. He's been a member off the Socialist Party since 1951, served on its National Committee, and was co-chair of the party twice. He ran for Congress in 1968 on the Peace and Freedom Ticket, for President as the Socialist Party candidate twice, and for US Senate from New York on the Green Party ticket. A Saving Remnant; The Radical Lives of Barbara Deming and David McReynolds, by Martin Duberman (The New Press, 2012), tells the story of two great activists.

#### Sunday, April 8, 2012, 11:00 A.M. Peace-Building, Local to Global Dorothy J. Maver, Ph.D., President, National Peace Academy

Dr. Maver is an educator and peacebuilder whose keynote is inspiring cooperation on behalf of the common good. Dot is President of the National Peace Academy in the USA, a founder of the Global Alliance for Ministries and Infrastructures of Peace, serves as Executive Director of The River Phoenix Center for Peacebuilding, and helps coordinate Push4Peace. Her work in education, politics and

grassroots community organizing is focused on applied peace-building utilizing a shared responsibility and shared leadership model. Dot served as Executive Director of The Peace Alliance and Campaign for a US Department of Peace, and prior to that was the National Campaign Manager for Kucinich for President, 2004. In the world of fast-pitch softball, Dr. Dot is known for her revolutionary fast-pitch hitting technique, The Maver Method: Secrets of Hitting Success. She is coauthor of Conscious Education: The Bridge to Freedom, and is a keynote speaker and workshop facilitator at conferences worldwide. Dot online:

Sunday, April 22, 2012, 11:00 A.M. The Eudaimonic Turn: A Look at the Science and Culture of Human Flourishing

James Pawelski, Ph.D., Positive Psychology Center, University of Pennsylvania

There is a eudaimonic turn afoot. A shift toward the scientific and cultural investigation of what makes individuals and communities thrive is taking place in fields as wide-ranging as psychology,

neuroscience, medicine, business, economics, education, philosophy, and literary studies. What exactly is this eudaimonic turn? What new knowledge is it creating? How can we use this new knowledge for greater flourishing in our own lives and in our communities?

Dr. Pawelski is Director of Education and Senior Scholar in the Positive Psychology Center and Adjunct Associate Professor of Religious Studies in the School of Arts and Sciences at the University Pennsylvania. He directs Penn's Master of Applied Positive Psychology (MAPP) program and is the Executive Director of the International Positive Psychology Association. A philosopher by training, Dr. Pawelski is the author of The Dynamic Individualism of William James, editor of the philosophy section of the forthcoming Oxford Handbook of Happiness, co-editor of The Eudaimonic Turn: Well-Being in Literary Studies (forthcoming), and coeditor of Touched with Fire: The Poetry of Human Flourishing (in progress).

You'll feel much richer for the experience, and indeed you will be. Our Peace Initiatives Workshop scheduled on April 7th, to be led by Dot Maver and Martha Gallahue, is an idea we brought back from the 96th Assembly. When you attend the Assembly, you have a chance to shape the national movement. We will be discussing and voting on resolutions submitted by various Societies. The Ethical

Humanist Society of Philadelphia is submitting one this year. You will find it at the end of this article. As you might have guessed, knowing us Ethical Humanists, you will hear impassioned views on both sides of the issues during discussion. We will be voting on all resolutions at the business meeting. If you are a delegate, you will get to vote. But you'll have a chance to express your opinion in support of our resolution even if you're not a delegate.



Officers and directors of the AEU Board are elected at the Annual Assembly. You will have the opportunity to meet the candidates, whose bios will appear in the Assembly packet that every attendee receives upon arrival at the hotel. In this packet you will also find the proposed AEU budget for the coming year so you can see where your money that was paid as our Society's apportionment is going. Delegates get to vote on the Board candidates and the budget. You will most likely hear lively debate on the budget and can propose questions and comments even if you are not a delegate.

The packet contains contact information on every attendee, annual reports from the various Societies, proposed resolutions, business meeting agendas, minutes of last year's meetings, order forms for books and other goodies (did I mention you can shop at the Assembly?) as well as more valuable information that will be of use during and after the Assembly.

Our Society's board has nominated our own Carol Love to receive the Anna Garlin Spencer Award, an award bestowed on volunteers who have given exceptional service to their Societies. 

Sunday, April 29, 2012, 11:00 A.M. Rampant Inequality: The Hidden Cause of the Great Recession Joseph Schwartz, Ph.D., Professor of Political Science, Temple University

The rampant growth of inequality over the past thirty-five years played a major role in causing the Great Recession. To sustain their modest standard of living, working families went heavily into debt. United States transnationals, on the other hand, could no longer earn satisfactory profits in the United States and turned to foreign outsourcing and financial speculation. Despite the conservative nostrums that only further cuts in working people's wages and benefits can lead to economic recovery, long-term global economic health must be rooted in a more egalitarian distribution of income and wealth, and an economy that serves human needs rather than short-term corporate profits.

Dr. Schwartz is Professor and former chair of Political Science at Temple University where he teaches political theory and American politics. He is the winner of several university teaching awards. His most recent book, The Future of Democratic Equality: Reconstructing Social Solidarity in a Fragmented United States (Routledge, 2009) recently won the American Political Science Association's David Easton prize for the best recent book in political theory. He serves as a National Vice-Chair of Democratic Socialists of America(DSA). Hepublishes frequently in Dissent, In Theses Times, Tikkun, and other progressive publications.





## PHILLY ETHICS BOARD TO PROTEST CHANGE IN ELLIOTT-BLACK AWARD AT AEU MEETING

#### Resolution

Whereas, the Elliott-Black Award has historically been awarded to an individual or organization "who has made a significant ethical contribution to society at personal risk and hardship," and

Whereas, this award has epitomized the highest values and exemplifies the lives of these two iconic Ethical Culture Leaders and leaders of the Ethical Culture Movement, and

Whereas, eliminating the qualification of "at personal risk and hardship" from this award would serve to dilute and diminish its meaning; and

Whereas, it is the requirement of "at personal risk and hardship" that distinguishes the Elliott-Black award form a myriad of other service awards, and

Whereas, the high standard imposed in previous years has not created a shortage of worthy candidates, and

Whereas, there was minimal movement-wide consultation or consensus regarding this change in the qualifications for recipients of this award, and

Whereas, the Ethical action Committee of the Ethical Humanist Society of Philadelphia, as a protest to the changed standards, has refused to nominate a candidate for the 2012 Elliott-Black award, and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the Ethical Humanist Society of Philadelphia, acting upon the recommendation of its Ethical Action Committee, has unanimously resolved to attempt to reinstate the qualification of "at personal risk and hardship" as a criterion for this award,

Now Therefore Be It Resolved, by the Board of Trustees of the Ethical Humanist Society of Philadelphia that this resolution be made an agenda item at the Business meeting of the Assembly of the American Ethical Union to be held in Albany, New York in June 2012 so as to restore the requirement that the candidate's work be done "at personal risk and hardship" to the list of qualifications for candidates of the Elliott-Black Award.
