Leader's Message:

Ethical Culture in the Humanist Landscape – The Common Ground of Separation of Church and State

In the March 24th crowd of 10,000 people at the Reason Rally on the National Mall in Washington D. C., there wandered a handful of Ethical Humanists including myself and EHSoP members Sharon Wallis and Leonard Weeks. For the rest of this column, however, I want to focus on the common ground of the rally. On March 24th it wasn't always easy to find all the other Ethical Humanists in the crowd, whether they came from Philly, DC, Baltimore or

further afield. But maybe this is a good metaphor for an important challenge before Ethical Culture. As the voices of skeptics, freethinkers, atheists, agnostics, and humanists are being heard in the national dialogue, it is important to clarify where Ethical Culture fits in "the humanist landscape."

While the Reason Rally was a great success for a lot of reasons, from my point of view there was not enough of Ethical Culture's unique voice. That is to be expected given our very limited role in the event. Maybe next time we can try to get more involved.

So why were we there this year? Well, given Ethical Culture's emphasis on the uniqueness of each individual, each of us who attended had different reasons. Again, given the importance of freethought to most participants, this is not a surprise. I would like to suggest, however, one issue Ethical Culturists, other humanists, atheists, agnostics, and skeptics can agree on: the importance of maintaining the wall of separation between church and state.

The American Ethical Union has passed numerous resolutions over the years in support of Jefferson's wall, including the following:

In 1961 the AEU "vigorously oppose[d] all federal and state aid to church-related schools and at the same time continue[d] the fight for separation of church and state" by opposing "prayers in public schools, religious symbols displayed inside and outside public schools, and the phrase 'under God' included in the Pledge of Allegiance." This was reinforced in 1962 when the AEU said, "The separation of Church and State in every area is of paramount importance for the insuring of the religious freedom of all individuals."

In 1967 the AEU demanded recognition for non-theistic conscientious objectors.

In 1971 the AEU said that ending government aid to private and parochial schools is an important way to "uphold the

principle of free public schools as a cornerstone of our democracy."

In 1983 the AEU condemned President Reagan's cold war theology and his claim that "the United States is compelled by scripture and the Lord Jesus Christ to oppose Russia with all military and political means"!

Given our history, it is no surprise that the Ethical Union is a member of the Secular Coalition for America (SCA) earning the AEU a spot on their board. Our own **Arnold Fishman** has been our voice there. The SCA was a sponsor of the Reason Rally. This helps explain Ethical Culture's place in the humanist landscape. Our movement fully supports the separation of church and state. We agree with a fundamental goal of the SCA: "protecting and strengthening the secular character of our government."



It is for this reason that I am nurturing a relationship with Ed Joyce

and the Delaware Valley Chapter of Americans United for Separation of Church and State. I recently joined their Clergy Advisory Board and spoke at their April 17th program at the First Unitarian Church on Chestnut Street on the ethics of church/state separation.

I am far from an expert in constitutional law, but I know enough U. S. history and ethics to commit myself to helping clear away the disinformation and historical revisionism thrown out by theocrats trying to take over our government. I want to defend freedom of conscience and religion in the most efficient and ethical way possible: by maintaining Jefferson's wall of separation!

This fall I hope to launch a series of programs here on Rittenhouse Square on the Constitution and democracy with some specific focus on church/state issues. If you are interested in helping plan and organize these events, please contact me at leaderhugh@phillyethics.org.

Ethical Culture has consistently condemned capital punishment both on ethical grounds and because this system is also extremely costly. There are currently over 200 persons on death row in Pennsylvania, with only three executions since 1978. Our Splendid Day – April 15, 2012

"May this splendid day be long remembered, and may it open the door even further to a bright future that will enlighten and empower us all." - Mary Herman, Leader for Congregational Life, Washington Ethical Society.

Outside, Rittenhouse Square was awakening to the first flowers of spring. Inside, Spring flowed through the Society building festooned with red azaleas, purple salvias, and tiger-eye pansies ready for our splendid day, April 15, the formal installation of our new leader, Hugh Taft-Morales. At the end of the day he reminded us that this ceremony "recommits us to the values and mission of Ethical Humanism and to building our house together."

In his morning platform address, "Existential Faith: Choosing Ethical Culture," Hugh explained how existentialism, often portraved as dark and depressive, helps him nurture both joy and commitment to Ethical Humanism. "I want to do the work of the world as common as mud yet full of meaning. Appreciating my limited time here helps me do this work. ... Existentialism helps me sort out my values."

The late afternoon Installation Ceremony brought together Ethical Humanist Society of Philadelphia members and friends, with the vast network of Hugh's past connections. Included were his family, his close friends as far back as college, and members of the Washington Ethical Society who nurtured his growing commitment to Ethical Humanism, first as an active member and President, and then as a Leader in Training and finally as a Leader.

Presided over by Temma Fishman, the ceremony, through music, words, and ceremonial reading and signing of the Act of Installation document, celebrated both the intellect and spirit of our Society's formal acknowledgment of Hugh's leadership, and our willingness to move forward with him in bringing out the best in Ethical Humanism.

From Kasia's Prelude as guests were taking their seats and the rousing Finlandia sung by all, to the music performed throughout by the Washington Ethical Society Chorus under the director of Bailey Whiteman, the auditorium was filled with sound: the Wailin' Jennys' This Is The Sound of One Voice, You Are the New Day (John David, arr. By Peter Knight), and finally a rousing singalong of With a Little Help from My Friends, (John Lennon and Paul McCartney), that concluded the ceremony.

Kate Esposito and Lyle Murley brought passion and meaning to Marge Piercy poem, "To Be of Use," that introduced the central value of Hugh's leadership. WES Leader for Congregational Life Mary Herman recalled her experiences with Hugh over the years as WES member and later Leadership training classmate.

She concluded, "You chose as vour Leader one of the most gifted leaders in our movement ... a true gentleman of deep ethical insight, uncompromising values, abundant gifts and vision. A Leader who respects what you have been and done in the charters of your past. A Leader Mary Herman, Washington Leader with a deep, abiding $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Ethical}}$ Society



and fierce love for Ethical Culture. A leader with wisdom that comes from a lifetime of commitment to the worth and dignity of every person." Susan Rose, Dean, American Ethical Union Leadership Training Program, recalled receiving a paper from Hugh on his experiences teaching in Guatemala and initially deciding she would glance at it and then save it for later. Instead, she read to the very end his haunting description of Guatemalan families that Hugh and his family helped for seven months. Moving from the biographical to historical. Joe Chuman, leader of New York Society of Ethical Culture, traced Ethical Culture's long history of leadership in social reform and social justice, a legacy that Hugh is remarkably well suited to carry on. He praised the Philadelphia Society for recognizing leadership through an installation ceremony.

The solemn part of the ceremony was facilitated by Jeff Dubb. Bertha Waters, as the first generation of a fourgeneration family of Ethical Culturists, presented the docu-Temma ment to who explained it. Members read their commitment

to Hugh in unison, and Hugh made his promise to serve our community as leader. Hugh and Temma then signed the document. Members will add their signatures over the next few weeks.

At the reception, champagne toasts were given by Carol Love, Terry Martin-Murley, Arnold Fishman, Michael French and others. Betsy Lightbourn then presented Hugh with the Society's gifts in his honor to two organizations. 
