Sunday Events

Sunday, June 17. This is Fathers' Day, and **Lyle Murley** will lead a discussion of a number of poets' presentations of the realities and illusions they confront as they consider fathers and children. Martin Buber argues that "with each child the human race begins anew." While no advanced reading will be required for participating in the discussion, a few poems will be available at the Ethical Humanist Society by June 10.

Sunday, July 1. Ron Coburn will lead a discussion of Philip Zimbardo's recently-published book, The Lucifer Effect: Understanding How People Turn Evil. In 1971, Stanford University psychology professor Philip Zimbardo created the Stanford Prison Experiment, in which 24 college students were randomly assigned the roles of prison guards and prisoners at a makeshift jail on campus. The experiment was scheduled to run for two weeks. By the second day, the guards were going far beyond just keeping the prisoners behind bars. In scenes eerily similar to Abu Ghraib, prisoners were stripped naked; bags were put on their heads, and they were sexually humiliated. The two-week experiment had to be canceled after just six days.

Sunday, July 29. Ken Greiff asks us to look with him at the teachings of Jesus. What does Jesus say is required to be good, or to enter into the Kingdom of Heaven? Ken says, "I'm focused on the character of Jesus as depicted in the four gospels, not the historic man, or how what he said has been interpreted by subsequent followers. To make the conversation manageable, I would carefully scrutinize The Sermon on the Mount (not so much the Beatitudes), a relatively short document that everyone could reasonably prepare by reading Matthew 5-7. Then they can point out how little it is followed by modern religion. Or they can contemplate the extraordinary things it is actually calling people to do."

Sunday, August 12. Nick Sanders will facilitate a discussion of *The Sacred Depths of Nature* by Ursula Goodenough, one of America's leading cell biologists and author of a best selling textbook on genetics. She is also a deeply spiritual person and has served as president of the Institute on Religion in an Age of Science. *The Sacred Depths of Nature* is a small, though substantial, book. It begins with what science has to say about the origins of our Earth and of life on Earth. Goodenough discusses how organisms and evolution work, awareness, emotions, meaning, sex, sexuality, and death. At the end of the scientific portion of each chapter is a short religious response, like a meditation. Generally this is drawn from the author's own emotional or mental state that is elicited when she thinks about the subject of that chapter's part in the evolutionary story.


