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President's Message



At our Humanist Thanksgiving celebration in November, the Ethical Society collected over \$1000 for KIVA, an organization that makes available small loans to people in developing countries. KIVA fights poverty and encourages human dignity by providing loans to people working to develop small businesses in countries such as Togo, Uganda, Pakistan, Nigeria, Ecuador and others where people struggle to provide for themselves and their families. Our Ethical Action Committee (EAC) promoted this project, which supports the first Millennium Development Goal, "Eradicate extreme hunger and poverty" and the third, "Promote gender equality and empower women." KIVA, in turn, provides progress reports on what is happening to the money donated. For example, Munirjon Mansurov, a clothing salesman in Tajikistan has repaid 100% of his loan, Rosemary Ebowe from Nigeria, who owns a food market business, has repaid 75% of hers, and Victoria Marca, who runs a general store in Ecuador, has repaid 25%.

At this point, \$516.25 in KIVA credit has been released to our account. The money we loaned is being returned to us for relending or some other purpose to be determined by the EAC. It is a winwin situation. Individuals as well as organizations can lend money to KIVA. You can get more details and see who the lenders are when you explore the KIVA website. We are in good company.



Ethical Action Committee Report


The EAC started this season with a good strong committee meeting and lots to do. Activities for
